

# Dynette Elaine Hart

## Woman of the Year, 2020 | Community Life

For more than a half century Dynnette (Dee) Nelson Hart has given her time and talents to inspiring and helping others. She graduated from Loma Linda University School of Nursing with a Baccalaureate degree in Nursing in 1966 and a Masters in Nursing in 1968. She and her husband Ken, a graduate of the School of Medicine at Loma Linda University accepted a call to work as missionaries in Africa where they served for the next two decades. For the first four years they worked in Zambia, where she served as "Sister-Tutor" at Mwami Adventist Nursing School while being a mother to their two small children .

They returned on furlough to the United States so her husband could complete his MPH at Johns Hopkins University and they then returned to Africa. Their duty station was in Tanzania where Dee taught maternal and child health education at Tanzania Adventist Seminary and College (now the University of Arusha) until 1982.

The next study leave brought the Harts back to Loma Linda where her husband completed a residency in Preventive Medicine and again they returned to Africa. This time to Nairobi, Kenya where Dee served as a nurse at Nairobi Seventh-day Adventist Health Service.

After their final return to the United States in 1987, Dee was asked to join the faculty of the Loma Linda University School of Nursing. She taught Pediatric Nursing and worked as a pediatric hematology/oncology nurse at the Medical Center. While working at the University, she completed her Dr. PH and when Loma Linda University opened the Social Action Corp Health System (SACHS) Norton Clinic she worked for a year helping to get the clinic organized.

During the years she taught at the School of Nursing, Dee coordinated nursing courses, earned a Pediatric Nurse Practitioner Certificate, continued to serve the underserved community at SACHS as a nurse practitioner and became the Associate Dean for the Undergraduate Program, a position she held until her retirement in 2016.

After her retirement she volunteered at the newly established San Manuel Gateway College, sponsored by Loma Linda University for students from low-income families in the San Bernardino area. She used her skills and knowledge to develop the educational programs, which included curriculum development, program accreditation, and administration. Her work was instrumental in getting all of their programs started and accredited.

Through Dee's work and encouragement as a mentor, many students from Loma Linda University have developed an interest in community service. And at Gateway College, students who likely would have never attended college experienced Dee's deep love and desire to see them achieve a life of unselfish service like hers.

# Nyslie Guerrier

## Woman of the Year, 2020 | Community Life

Pastor Nyslie Guerrier, received her Bachelor's in Business Administration from Bernard Baruch College of NYC Universities in Human Resources & Business Administration, and minored in African American studies and Civil Rights Law and Litigation. After working in the corporate sector for a few years, she then pursued higher education and graduated from Fuller Theological Seminary with a Master's in Divinity and Master's in Pastoral Care and Recovery. She trained as a Chaplain at the St. Joseph Medical Center in Burbank, CA. She then transitioned and worked with the Los Angeles Mission at the Anne Douglas Center with women in recovery from homelessness, drug and alcohol addiction, sexual assault, trauma, human trafficking, domestic violence, partner violence, and spiritual abuse.

She currently serves as Elder at the Mt. Rubidoux SDA Church, where she is the Director of Family Life and coordinator for Women's Ministry. She is a Pastor, Chaplain, Teacher, Recruiter, Trainer, Life Coach, Motivational Speaker, Preacher and Social Activist. Her ministry emphasis is on pastoral care, discipleship and life management. Her focus is on restoring people and their relationship with God; people battling addiction, social economical and health injustices. She is currently in the process of following her passion and purpose and is setting up a non-profit entity to continue the ministry that God has laid on her heart. This non-profit will have several sections:

1. Focus on providing support for the community with a community center,
2. Transitional home for aged-out foster girls.
3. Ministry Consultant to help Christian institutions set up relevant ministries in order to answer the needs of their communities.
4. Christian Association providing leadership, empowerment, mentoring and support to women and helping them to live their best God purposed life.

Chaplain Nyslie has been instrumental in adapting the support groups to an online platform. One of which is the weekly Saturday afternoon, The Chat that highlights women's issues and social justice topics. The panelist consists of licensed psychologist, pastors and credentialed experts in the field. In addition, along with her team, the Family Life Department had a successful virtual Game Night with participants from various states and Canada.

Mt. Rubidoux is grateful that she continues to listen to the voice of God to "download" innovative and progressive ideas and programs to meet the needs of the church and the community.

# Dina Salas Montoya

## Woman of the Year, 2020 | Spiritual Leadership

As an expression of the love that united Don Benil and Doña Zoraida, Juana Dina Salas Montoya came into the world on May 27. The city of Arequipa welcomed her in its arms, and nourished her soul with innocence and her spirit with strength.

Dina was born into an Adventist family of four siblings. She loved poetry and used to recite poems in church, from a very young age. As a child, she was welcomed into the pulpit so one Friday night, at the young age of seven, to preach her first sermon on "The Origin of Good and Evil". That was the beginning of a life-long journey of serving God and His people.

As a teenager, she decided to consecrate her life to God, entering the baptismal waters at the age of twelve. She attended primary and secondary education in her native land, where she continued to speak and recite. During those school years, she made the decision to be a missionary. In order to fulfill her dream she traveled to Sao Paulo, Brazil, to study theology and learn more about God. She completed theology studies full of passion and dreams, and with great courage she undertook her mission in the Work of the Lord.

In 1977, she began her ministry in the South Peruvian Mission, first in Arequipa, then in Ilo, Sicuani, Camaná and Mollendo, reaching the position of District Missionary in Camaná, thus becoming the first and only woman to lead a missionary district in Peru. In 1985, she was appointed Preceptor of the Home of Young Ladies of the Universidad Peruana Unión, where she was a mother and a sister for the students. In March 1987, she began work in the Missionary Medical Field, with the position of Chaplain at the Good Hope Clinic. A few years before, Dina had undergone a surgical intervention, having to remain hospitalized for twelve days. This experience helped her develop a unique empathy for the patients to whom she later carried the message of hope.

Dina Salas has participated prominently in various world congresses and international conferences in different countries. In 1997, she actively participated for three months in missionary campaigns in New York City, invited by one of the local churches.

In her constant desire to get closer to God and to know more about Him, in 1998, she traveled to the Holy Land where he visited Nazareth, Jordan, the Dead Sea and the Sea of Galilee, following in the footsteps of Jesus. In 2000, she continued her work in the Chaplaincy of the Ana Stahl Clinic in the city of Iquitos. In 2002, she returned to the Good Hope Clinic, continuing her dedicated work, always at the service of patients, whom she comforted with her kind words of encouragement, her songs and her prayers.

Thanks to her abundant spiritual virtues, Dina Salas is a member of the Council of Ambassadors for Peace, belonging to the United Nations, whose president in Peru is Dr. Trébol Jhones. In 2014, within the celebrations for International Women's Day, Dina was distinguished as "Outstanding Miraflores Woman", being decorated by the Mayor of the Municipality of Miraflores, who awarded her the Medal of Honor for Merit, for the laudable work done on behalf of patients who seek healing for their illnesses, and who in addition receive spiritual healing.

In all places and circumstances, Dina has been described by her wonderful smile, her permanent willingness to serve and her contagious optimism, which has allowed her to build strong bonds of sincere friendship and earn the appreciation and affection of many people. Throughout her forty years of ministry, Dina has brought more than 500 souls to the feet of Jesus, including those of many patients and their families.

In 2017, Dina Salas officially retired from her pastoral ministry. As she walked in the footsteps of Jesus, she leaves behind a legacy of absolute dedication, sacrificial service, and unbounded love.



# Hilde Thorkildson Huru

## Woman of the Year, 2020 | Spiritual Leadership

"As a child I loved church and it spilled over into the games I played. I conducted church services and communions with the neighbourhood kids. My parents were new converts to the Adventist church and the love of Jesus had made such a great impact. They also told their story with joy and excitement to anyone who would like to listen – and quite a few more. When I grew a little older my dreams changed as I realized pastoring was 'not for girls.'

"At sixteen, I helped the pastor visiting people who came to an evangelistic series. In one home an 18 year- old girl living with her alcoholic parents could only receive guests in her own bedroom. So, I was the one visiting her – studying the Bible with her and feeling the exuberant joy the day she gave her life to Jesus, and was baptized. – I wanted more of this!! I decided to study Theology at Newbold College. While there I read about E. G. White and some of the women of her time, preaching, teaching, and exercising their spiritual gifts. I came to realize that I could be a pastor after all. More than any other job, this was my dream.

"In my last year, the conference presidents came to the college to talk to the graduating students, but no one spoke to me. If that longing in my heart was really from God, then He would have to open a door (or even just a window). The window God opened for me was in the Arctic.

"My first year was hard. I often preached at the local church while I was a chaplain at our Adventist sanatorium in Tromsø. Though this was a congregation with many open minded people, I could still feel the coldness of some members. One lady in particular made it clear to me every time we passed. When I looked at her to say hello, she met my eyes, then demonstratively turned her head the other way – refusing to greet me. Interestingly, after hearing my testimony, she became a supporter of my ministry, together with some of the others whom at first had rejected me.

"As the first woman pastor I was always very careful not to rock the boat - I had to pave the way for other women to follow. I never complained when my colleagues were ordained, but not me. I knew I was ordained by God, and I prayed for Him to help me accept that this was enough until the church was ready to recognize my calling. My greatest fear was that I would turn bitter and no longer be effective.

"After eight years in ministry, they decided to have a commissioning prayer for me at camp meeting. My heart was filled with joy that finally someone would lay their hands on me, and set me aside for my ministry. My parents travelled 2000 km to be there with me that very day. Only minutes before the service the union president whispered to me: "We will, of course, not be laying our hands on you as we pray, because we don't want to create any misunderstanding that this is an ordination." I was lost for words. This was the first time in my ministry that I almost rebelled. Had not my parents been in the audience, looking forward to this great day, I would have called off the service, telling them I'd come back when they could set me aside for my task the Biblical way. I was so disappointed! It is hard being the first; every commissioning after mine has been conducted by the laying on of hands.

"When women act sweet and soft in the boardroom or executive committee, men interpret it as being unassertive and without substance. So unconsciously they pass her when it is her time to speak. In order to be heard I had to act more forcefully, but find a balance so as not to be perceived as domineering. I had to interrupt, in a gentle but assertive manner. It was important to have something great to say when I spoke up. I think I spent twice as much time preparing for meetings as any of the men there. However, slowly things changed. My turn was never missed anymore. And I earned respect for my contributions.

"For the last five years the Executive Committee of the Norwegian Union has had many wise women. The men have gotten used to women participating rigorously in the discussion and in the decision making. And I have noticed, that if somebody gets overlooked, it is not any of the women – because they bring up such great contributions that everybody is eager to hear what they have to say."

I ended up pastoring from 1990-2008. I was a member of the North- and West-Norwegian Conference Committees for about 25 years, and a member of the Norwegian Union Executive Committee for 15 years. I am currently a member of the Trans-European Division Executive Committee.

"This is a description of my journey, along a route that has been discovered while travelling. I have been blessed to be one of the many vessels God is using to do His great work."

# Dr. Ginger Hanks Harwood

## Woman of the Year, 2020 | Outstanding Achievement

Dr. Harwood had devoted her scholarship to women in the church and issues of gender equality, often integrating her work in Biblical studies and church history into informed commitments for peace, justice, and ecology today.

Dr. Harwood along with Dr. Beverly Beem of Walla Walla University, began their research in the 1990s when discussion of the role of women in the church was addressing the *possibility* of women serving in leadership positions. We observed that those arguing either side were claiming that their position was the historic Adventist position, each with two or three reliable quotes to defend their position. The two researchers asked how can we know what the early Adventist position actually is on this issue. Carefully monitoring the discussions of the day, they decided to shift their study from current issues and debates to examine what was said in the early Adventist church about women in leadership.

They focused their research on the nineteenth-century issues of the *Review and Herald*, since that journal has always been the official voice of the Adventist Church. They carefully combed through the pages of the *Review*, beginning with volume 1, issue 1 to the last issue in 1899. They were searching for whatever women were writing or doing but also what the leaders of the Advent Movement and the early Adventist Church were saying about women in public ministry and on what grounds they were saying it. Some 15 major articles, as well as numerous notes and letters, particularly defended the right of women to speak in public with no arguments against it. The issue of the day was the propriety of women speaking in public, something that was against all the social and cultural mores of the day. Adventist church leaders urged women to cast off the restraints of society and the influences of the fallen churches that had kept them in silence. which had allowed leaders to assume all the responsibilities of discipleship. Writers based their pleas on the needs of the church to spread the third angel's message quickly through the whole world and on Scripture carefully interpreted with a sound hermeneutic. Writers particularly addressed the arguments of Paul that were often interpreted by other churches and new converts to limit the work of women in the church.

The slow and careful walk through the pages of the *Review* led to an exploration of other issues that engaged our pioneers, especially their experience of spirituality and concerns for social justice that were living issues in the early Adventist church. A receptive audience for Harwood and Beem's work was found in AAW meetings and publications; i.e., *Andrews University Seminary Studies* and *Spectrum*, plus presentations at churches, women's retreats, and various groups.

Dr. Harwood brought to this project an amazing breadth of knowledge of Adventist history, feminist theory, and social contexts. Friends affirm her personal integrity that embodies all that she believes about justice, compassion, and kindness as a friend, mentor, and mother in Israel. Her fellow researcher found during their thirty years of researching, writing, speaking, and publishing, she maintained an active life as a university professor and leader in her church, both in La Sierra and Chico where she now lives. All the while her legendary sense of humor cuts through the nonsense and never fails to bring a smile to whatever group.

Dr. Harwood was ordained at La Sierra. She has lived a life dedicated to ministry in the Seventh-day Adventist Church and one that recognized the work of all women in the Adventist church from the beginning of the movement until now.

# Daniel Jackson

**Champion of Justice, 2020 | Past President, North American Division, 2019**

# Ricardo Graham

**Champion of Justice, 2020 | President, Pacific Union College**

Ricardo Graham has served as president of the Pacific Union Conference since 2007. He has twenty-three years of administrative experience in the Seventh-day Adventist Church, having previously served as executive secretary of the Pacific Union Conference, president of the Northern California Conference, and executive secretary of the Northern California conference. Before assuming administrative responsibilities, Graham served as a pastor, originally in the Lake Region Conference in the mid-West of the United States and more recently in California.

Graham has a Bachelor of Arts degree from Oakwood College, a Master of Divinity degree from Andrews University, and a Doctor of Ministry degree from San Francisco Theological Seminary. He has written numerous articles for church publications, including *Ministry* magazine, *Message* magazine, *Signs of the Times* (Australia) and the *Adventist Review*. He has authored two books, *Jesus Unlimited* and *The Book of Job*. Graham is a native of Detroit, Michigan. He is married to Audrey Weir Graham, an educator, and they have two adult children, Jessica and Jonathan.

# Dave Weigley

## Champion of Justice, 2020 | Columbia Union Conference

Elected in 2006, Dave Weigley, serves as president of the Columbia Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. This administrative organization—headquartered in the eight states in the Mid-Atlantic United States—is comprised of eight conferences with more than 146,000 members, 850 churches, 81 elementary and secondary schools, two healthcare networks with 12 hospitals, Washington Adventist University in Maryland and Kettering College in Ohio.

Dave was one of eight children raised by Adventist dairy farmers in Enders, Pa. (near Hershey). Because of their strong commitment, his parents sacrificed to send all their children through Christian education (seven of the eight to Blue Mountain Academy in Hamburg, Pa). "From 1955-1970 there was always a Weigley at BMA," he says. "Sometimes when they needed to pay the tuition bills, they'd sell a cow."

Weigley attended Washington Adventist University (Maryland) and graduated from Southern Adventist University (Tennessee), where he completed a Bachelor of Arts in Theology. He also holds a Master of Business Administration in Managerial Leadership from City University of Seattle (Washington) and a Doctor of Philosophy in Leadership from Andrews University (Michigan).

He has served the Church as a pastor, evangelist, conference communication director, ministerial director, stewardship director, executive secretary and president. In North America he has worked in the Arizona, Carolina, Florida (9 years), Iowa-Missouri, Washington (14 years) and Potomac conferences. His ministry has also taken him to Africa, Asia, Euro-Asia, Southeast Asia, Indochina and South America. Weigley and his wife Becky have two adult children—Christy and Jon—and five grandchildren.

In May 2016, he was re-elected for an unprecedented third, five-year term. His vision, drive and results-oriented leadership have made an indelible mark, evidenced by the growth of the Adventist Church in the Mid-Atlantic during his tenure.

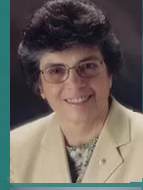

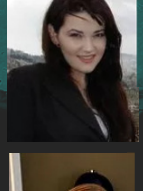
